Next Meeting

A note to all members: get your tips together and bring them to the meeting to share with the rest of the group. It will help make us all better turners.

Last Meeting

Woodturners have been turning pens for many years and most of them have been based on a pen kit that has all the parts and instructions of how to assemble the finished pen in a bag. The turners challenge is to get the appropriate material for the body of the pen and turn it to match the parts in the kit. What constitutes a custom pen? Some would say anything that isn't a give away plastic advertising item would qualify. Our demonstrator last month, Tim McGill, looks at this question from a completely different point of view. His idea would be to start with a kit

but modify it so that it doesn't resemble the picture in the catalog. Going farther, he suggests starting with the ink supply and designing the pen around that. Designing a pen this way will require a great deal of measuring accuracy for all of the parts to fit together properly and not having a finished product that is uncomfortable to write with. A large selection of drill



bits, both numbered and fractional sizes and taps and dies are necessary if you are to use more than one style of ink supply. Carefully sketching out the pen design with the component sizes will reduce the possibility of mishaps during construction. Tim provided several handouts which were very helpful in remembering all the things he talked about as well as sources to purchase individual components for pens.

All About Safety

CA (Cyanoacrylate, not California) glues are one of a turners best friends used in the making of pens, keeping bark on natural edge bowls, repairing small checks, gluing stock onto faceplate blocks, used as a finish on small turnings and for whenever we need a strong, quick setting bond. CA has a rather short shelf life, typically 1 year from the date of manufacture if unopened or 1 month once opened. The shelf life can be extended somewhat if unopened containers are stored in a refrigerator. Chilling an opened container is not recommended as it will cause moisture from air to condense causing deterioration.

Cyanoacrylates were discovered in 1942 in a search to make clear plastic gun sights in WW II but this stuff stuck to everything it came in contact with and was rejected for this application. Eastman Kodak rediscovered cyanoacrylates and it was marketed as Eastman 910 in 1958. They then sold this to Loctite in the early 1960's. CA glues are now made by many different manufactures and are available in 3 viscosities, Thin with a very short (~ 5 second) working time before set up, Medium with about 10 – 15 seconds of set up time and Thick with ~ 30 seconds is set up time. An accelerator can be used to provide almost instantaneous set ups.

CA adhesives can glue skin & eyelids together in a matter of seconds. In the course of separating glued body parts (never a pleasant situation), injuries can occur by ripping off parts of the skin. If left alone, the glue will separate from the skin in due course (up to 4 days). This separation process can be accelerated by applying vegetable oil on or around the glue. In the case of glued eyelids, get to a doctor immediately!!!

CA fumes can irritate sensitive membranes in the eyes, nose & throat and repeated exposure can cause flu like symptoms. On rare cases, it can trigger asthma! Work with CA glue in a well-ventilated area. Wearing a face mask or a respirator can minimize these adverse symptoms.
